THE YARD ROCK from Chris Rutherford (of the Montgomery club)

It has been my experiences over the years that geologists (and I include rock hounds in that category now too) can be divided into two types:

+ Those who have more rocks inside their home than they do in the eroded goat path they call a driveway

+ Those who have manicured landscapes that rival the finest gardens of European aristocrats.

The latter type of rock collectors are always on the hunt for a prized and elusive specimen, the Yard Rock. The Yard Rock may be overlooked by some collectors as nothing more than just a common stone found along life's journey, but to the right collector it is a one-of-a-kind find that they already have a perfect place in their master garden design for it.

Yard rocks have one common trait: they are no larger in size than what the collector can manhandle alone into to the back of his pickup or trunk of their car. To some, this would be a stone no larger than the size of a baseball. To the more serious, it could be a hernia-inducing behemoth the size of a TV set. I myself have been scolded by my cardiologist for collecting too large a rock too soon after heart catheter operation. But, in my defense, how often do you stumble upon a pegmatite granite in a rip-rap pile in Pike County, Alabama? Or for that matter, how about that snow-white Sylacauga marble that looks like a dinosaur took a bite out of it? Both are worthy specimens to border an-other flower bed in the back yard.

Along with naturally occurring stone, I also welcome numerous manmade objects into the yard rock category. I am not going to pass by a nice big piece of brass slag at an abandoned factory just because it's manmade. There were some very nice looking glass slag pieces from a steel foundry that I turned my nose up in my early days that I now regret I had collected. My favorite places to collect yard rocks include rip rap stock-piles at construction sites, road cuts, spoil piles at mines, slag dumps at foundries, any field that has a sign in the front that says "fill dirt wanted", wade-able streams near bridges, and demolition sites. <u>Question ??</u> How many landscaping rocks do you have ? The Yard Rock Pictures






Cleavage and fracture are descriptions of how a mineral breaks into pieces.

Cleavage describes how a mineral breaks into flat surfaces (usually one, two, three or four suraces). Cleavage is determined by the crystal structure of the mineral.

Fracture describes how a mineral breaks into forms or shapes other than flat surfaces. Not all minerals have cleavage, however, all minerals will have some form of fracture.


Common Cleavage Descriptions ~



Cubic – when a mineral breaks in three directions and the cleavage planes form right angles (90 degrees to each other). Results in pieces in the shape of a cube.



Octahedral – when a mineral breaks in the form of a diamond, resulting in 8 nearly equal faces.



Rhombohedral – when a mineral breaks in three directions and the cleavage planes form angles that are other than 90 degrees. The shape formed is called a rhombohedron.



Pinacoidal – when a mineral breaks in one direction, leaving a single flat surface (cleavage plane). When a mineral breaks into very thin sheets, like mica minerals, the pinacoidal cleavage is called micaceous.

Common Fracture Descriptions

1. Conchoidal: describes a curved, nearly rounded, smooth fracture that looks like the inside of a shell. This is seen best in the igneous rock, obsidian, but also in massive pieces of the mineral quartz.

- 2. Fibrous: describes minerals (like chrysotile asbestos) that break into fibers.
- 3. Splintery: describes minerals that break into stiff, sharp, needle-like pieces.
- 4. Hackly: describes fractures that have rough edges.
- 5. Uneven or irregular: describes minerals that break into rough, uneven surfaces.

Sometimes one person might identify a fracture as hackly and another would describe the same specimen as irregular because they are fairly close to each other in appearance. With more experience, a mineralogist can easily tell the difference between these two fractures.
