Hello my fellow rock hounds,



Dixie Mineral Club Fieldtrip An Official Field Trip of the The Middle Tennessee Rockhounds, Nashville, TN (Host)

Saturday October 3, 2015 10AM – 2PM CST Coon Creek Science Center McNairy County, Tennessee FEE \$15 – Limited to 35 participants

Description: Within the grounds of Coon Creek Science Center, located in rural McNairy County, Tennessee, lies one of the most important fossil sites in North America . Acquired by the Memphis Museum System in 1988, this property contains a treasure lode of superbly preserved Upper Cretaceous marine shells and vertebrate remains left there 70 million years ago when the water of the Gulf of Mexico receded. Coon Creek fossils are mostly marine invertebrates (clams, snails, oysters, shrimp etc.) that are about 75 million years old. They are found in an unconsolidated clay/sand matrix. Coon Creek fossils are very unique because of the state of their preservation. They are original material – the shells have not turned to stone. They are also very abundant with a huge variety of species. Collecting will take place in a "quarry" area. You will be "carving" fossils out of the Coon Creek formation by looking through chunks of the formation that have been loosened from the quarry. Participants will use a curved linoleum knife for collecting. Museum instructors will demonstrate how to collect your fossils and how to clean them. Everyone will find fossils! Some of the fossils are very fragile. The program includes time for surface collecting in Coon Creek for fossils that have been washed into the stream bed gravel. This will be guided by the museum staff. You keep what you find with a few exceptions. If you find a specimen that would be beneficial for the Museum's collection or research, the Museum reserves the right to keep that fossil. Program – Field Paleontology (4 Hours): Introduction – 30 minutes; Collecting Session (quarry and surface) – 2 Hour; Lunch – 30 minutes; Clean and Identify Fossils - 45 minutes

Registration Procedure: After you supply required information by email to Middle Tennessee Rockhounds (MTR), MTR will assign you a registration number by return email – bring registration number the day of the fieldtrip. [Instructions for mailing the \$15 per participant fee will be included with registration number.] Once registration reaches 35, registration is closed. *To register*, email MiddleTnRockhounds@gmail.com with: Name(s; Last, First), Address/ City/State, Phone (include cell for day of trip), club, age of children (must be 10 to 17 years old and accompanied by a parent or a guardian). Registration request are limited to family members, couples, and significant others; nonrelated individuals must email separate registration request. All persons who attend DMC fieldtrips (including children), must be members, in good standing, of an SFMS club (who has provided their membership with SFMS liability insurance).

Brad Smith Bench Tips ~ DEBURRING A HOLE

When you drill a hole, there's usually a burr produced on the underside of the metal. Typically,



burrs are removed by filing or sanding the area smooth, but doing it this way will put scratches on your piece that will have to be polished off.

A quick way to remove the burr is to grab a drill that's two or three times larger than your hole. Simply twist it in the hole to cut off the burr. I usually do this twisting by hand, but if you have many holes to do, it's easier on your fingers to put the drill into a holder like a pin vice.

CLEANING STEEL SHOT

Steel shot in a vibratory or rotary tumbler works great to burnish and shine your finished silver pieces. But a common problem is how keep the shot clean. Carbon steel shot can get rusty if exposed to the air, and even stainless steel shot can sometimes develop a blackish coating that's hard to remove.

My solution of choice to clean the shot is Classic Coke. Just pour an ounce or two over the shot and let the tumbler run for an hour or so. A bad case might require a second cleaning. Some folks like to let the bubbles in the Coke dissipate before using it so that gas pressure doesn't build up in the tumbler barrel. I've heard that it's the phosphoric acid in Coke that does the trick. While you're waiting for the shot to clean up, just settle back and enjoy the rest of the Coke.

The Joe and Frances Kontzen Scholarship

This scholarship was proposed after the death of Joe Kontzen by Rick Kittinger who was a long time show chairman. Rick knew Joe and Frances Kontzen well and for many years. They were very instrumental in the early years of the club and were active in the club for as long as they could. The Kontzen Scholarship is funded from the Tannehill show proceeds and is usually awarded annually at the December meeting. The Southeast Federation of Mineralogical Societies (SFMS) works with the two lapidary schools, William Holland and the Wild Acers Retreat (EFMS Workshop). The SFMS sets aside two sessions per school for a total of four sessions. This is a scholarship for one week of instruction in a class of your choice. Only one class of instructions will be awarded. You will have room and board with meals included. Each of these schools are different from the other but both are excellent in the classes offered.

By awarding this scholarship in December, it allows the recipient plenty of time after the holidays to decide on which class to choose. The schedules for classes at the two schools will be made public or posted. Usually the SFMS website has all the info including bios of the instructors after the first of the year. Each year the schedule offers a good range of classes and will have a variety of instructors with different ways of teaching. All who have attended regard this to be a informative way to learn more about any of the lapidary works.
