Dixie Mineral Club Fieldtrip An Official Field Trip of the Tampa Bay Mineral and Science Club

Saturday, January 9, 2016 Vulcan Limestone Mine 16313 Ponce De Leon Blvd, Brooksville, FL 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM

The January 9, 2016 field trip hosted by the Tampa Bay Mineral and Science Club will be to the Vulcan Limestone Mine to collect echinoids (fossil sand dollars and urchins), druzy calcite crystals and chert for cabbing. [Link to the fossil flier PDF] The meeting time will be 8:45 AM as we go into the mine in convoy at 9:00 AM. The gates are locked behind us so don't be late. If you are unavoidably detained, call Fred Hendershot (813-892-5864).

Directions to the Vulcan quarry: Take I-75 to exit #301, Brooksville. Go ten miles into Brooksville and follow Rt. 98. It will turn north in town and go another ten miles north. The Vulcan/Cemex signs are on the left (the Cemex sign is larger and easy to spot). Park in the large field and sign the Vulcan liability waiver. For Google Maps and GPS units, the address is 16313 Ponce De Leon Blvd., Brooksville, FL 34613.

Dress code: Sturdy closed shoes or sneakers, no sandals or open toed shoes. Jeans or long pants are preferred to protect your knees and long sleeve shirt or sun screen. If it is a bright day, a hat or ball cap would be useful. The one thing they do not have is a restroom, stop at the gas station in Brooksville before you arrive.

Equipment: This is surface hunting, so digging tools are not necessary, other than a screw driver or butter knife to pry fossils from dirt. A rock hammer is helpful at times if you want a piece of chert. We park at the hunting site, so you can leave your lunch, drinks and cooler in the car. Sun screen might be handy. Bring drinks and snacks as we stay until 12:00 noon and/or 2:00 PM.

DEPTH GAUGE FOR DRILLING

Sometimes you need to drill a number of holes all to the same depth. One quick and easy way to do this is to wind some tape around the drill bit so that the tape just touches the part surface when the hole

is deep enough.

You can set the depth either by measuring from the tip of the drill to the tape or by drilling to the correct depth, leaving the bit in the hole, and wrapping tape around the bit at the surface level.



Note that a little extra tape left free on the end will blow away debris from the drilling.

CUTTING A BOLT

Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to re-



store any distorted threads. The problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.

First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt.

Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.

ROCKHOUND ROUNDUP

AMLS Code of Ethics ~

- 1) I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
- 2) I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will ob serve them.
- 3) I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- 4) I will not go to field trip sites before the club.
- 5) I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- 6) Alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs are not permitted on field trips.
- 7) I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- 8) I will leave all gates as found.
- 9) I will discard no burning material matches, cigarettes, etc. on collecting sites.
- 10) I will fill all excavation holes that I dig.
- 11) I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- 12) I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

13) I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

- 14) I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority following this Code of Ethics in all collecting areas.
- 15) I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rock hounds everywhere.
- 16) I will dig only with permission of the landowner.
- 17) I will treat my fellow club members with respect.
- 18) Theft from club members will not be tolerated.
- 19) Club membership lists shall not be used for commercial or personal profit.

Where you might hear...

When looking at the gauge numbers of wire, it is normal to think: "the larger the number, the bigger the wire." However, wire gauges actually work in reverse: "**the larger the number, the smaller the wire**." This is because all jewelry wire sizes begin at the number 0, and each

time the wire is passed through a drawing die, it becomes smaller. So, a wire that is labeled as 22-gauge has been pulled 22 times, and it is 22 times smaller than its original size. The gauge equals the **diameter**

of the wire, meaning the distance straight across its center. In North America, the size of the holes in a wiredrawing die is based on a geometric formula developed in 1855 by the machine-tool company, Brown and Sharpe. This progression of 39 sizes is known as the American Wire Gauge (AWG). Other parts of the world may use the British Standard Wire Gauge (SWG), where the sizes are just a hair larger than those of the AWG.
