

TRIP: The property recently reopened after several months following the passing of Mrs. Propst. The property has been producing corundum, since the 1960's. Digging will take place in front and behind the barn as well as other possible areas designated by the current owner, Ronald Lineberger.

COLLECTING: Some large and unusual corundum specimens have been coming out of the ground recently including a large Kyanite included specimen and a small clear ruby. Good specimens of magnetite and quartz crystals are occasionally found. The ground is hard packed red clay. Digging can be easy or moderately hard depending on the location and depth of the hole you dig.

BRING: Long and short shovels and small or large buckets minimum. 1 inch and half inch classifiers, small picks, tarps and probing tools may come in handy. Bring water or soft drinks and snacks. An extra change of clothes may be needed as the ground is red clay.

FEE: \$25 per person

REQUIREMENTS: All collectors will be required to sign a permission / liability form and pay \$25 before setting up to dig. Digging is allowed in the designated areas only. All holes MUST be filled in before you leave the property.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Parking is on the grass near the dig area.

CHILDREN: Allowed with parental supervision.

PETS: Allowed on leash only.

FACILITIES: There is no toilet but there is a service station with facilities at the exit of HWY 321 and Startown Road

FIND THE BALANCE POINT

With odd-shaped pendants or earrings it's often difficult to find the right place to attach a bail or loop so that the piece is balanced and hangs straight. A quick way to make a tool for this is to modify a set of tweezers. Any set of tweezers will work. Spread the tips, sharpen them with a file, and bend the tips at a right angle to point towards each other. To use the tool suspend the pendant or earring between two sharp points to see how it will hang.





DRILL BREAKAGE

Using a small drill is difficult for a beginner, especially if it is hand held in a flexshaft or Dremel. They are easily broken if you push too hard or if you tilt the drill while it's in the hole.

Most problems, however, are the result of buying cheap drills that suffer from poor quality steel or inaccurately ground cutting edges. A good drill from jewelry supply companies is well worth the price.

Remember that drilling always goes easier with lubrication. A little wax or oil is all you need. Almost anything will work - Three and One, beeswax, mineral oil, injection wax, car oil, olive oil, or one of the commercial cutting waxes. The lubricant helps to move chips out of the hole and reduces friction of the drill against the side of the hole, keeping the drill cooler.

American Lands Access Association "Happy Rockhounding and Enjoy Your Public Lands" SENIOR PASS PRICE SKYROCKETING

On Tuesday December 6, 2016, in the lame duck session of Congress, the House passed by unanimous consent a bill (HR 4680) that will eliminate the \$10 lifetime Senior Pass (formerly Golden Age Pass) which has been available to citizens and permanent residents age 62 and older since 1965.

In the early hours of Saturday morning December 10, in a nearly empty Senate chamber - most members having already left for the holidays - the Senate approved the House bill by unanimous consent.

It was signed by President Obama before he left office

The lifetime pass will track with the price of the annual America the Beautiful Pass. That price is currently \$80 but can be changed at any time by the federal land management agencies, without further legislation.

For those who prefer an installment plan, a new "Senior Annual" pass will also be established at a price of \$20, good for one year from the date of purchase. Four consecutive Senior Annual passes can be exchanged for a lifetime pass.

While there have been a multitude of bills introduced (and programs authorized) aimed at giving new groups free or reduced-cost access to the public lands - 4th Graders, military families, those with disabilities, veterans, volunteers - it is difficult to understand why Congress has taken this opportunity to reduce a long-standing benefit to seniors. The \$20-\$35 million in anticipated additional revenue (depending on whose estimate you choose) will make little dent in the Park Service's claimed maintenance backlog of \$12 BIL-LION. All of this was done in the guise of celebrating the centennial of the National Park Service, although why making the Parks more expensive to visit constitutes a "celebration" remains a mystery.

BENEFITS

The benefits of the Senior Pass include entrance to all National Parks and Wildlife Refuges that charge entrance fees, for the pass holder and everyone accompanying them in the same vehicle. Where an NPS unit or a Refuge charges a per-person fee, the pass holder can bring in three companions age 16 or older. (Those under age 16 are free anyway.) The Senior Pass also covers Standard Amenity Fees at most Forest Service, BLM, Bureau of Reclamation, and Army Corps of Engineers sites. In addition, Senior pass holders are entitled to a 50% discount on campground fees for the site they occupy, including any younger friends and family members who accompany them.

These benefits are grandfathered- (and grand-

mothered-) in for existing pass holders. So if you have attained the age of 62 and have not yet purchased your lifetime Senior Pass, you should do it IMMEDIATELY. Passes are sold at National Parks, Forest Service, BLM and Bureau of Reclamation offices, National Wildlife Refuges, and Army Corps of Engineers recreation sites. Passes can be purchased online at the USGS Store, but online

Lapidary Whisperer Moving Mountains in Boxes

How a mineral is packaged is critical to maintaining its integrity, whether you are getting it for display or planning to commit lapidary on it.

When the Post Office found the package of Anthracite (yes, coal) I'd ordered, it was all by itself in a small bin. The seams and some of the fabric were gone along with about a third of my material. The shipper had put it into one of those presumably indestructible USPS Tyvek envelope/bags.

Guess what? The Post Office is *perfectly capable* of destroying them and whatever they hold. To be fair, they could have been better packed. But still . . .

When it didn't arrive in a timely manner, I checked with the vendor who confirmed it had been shipped and gave me a tracking number. After I tracked it to the local main post office, I went over. No problem, they knew the package, because it was sitting in plain view. But no one wanted to deliver the mess, and although they claimed they sent me multiple cards advising me of where I could get it, somehow the cards had proved too difficult to deliver also. So this is what I finally received.

HOME FROM THE SHOW/SALE Even when I'm in control of the rock constantly on its journey to my shop, I need to be sure your rock's not rolling - and bouncing other rocks in my trunk or the back of my husband's Ford Transit Connect which has an enclosed cargo bay.

Wrapping the rock individually in newspaper, towels or lots of bubble wrap is a good start for larger pieces. I then secure them in a box or other protective object and stabilized in place so they don't go flying around when I turn a corner. For smaller rocks/slabs, wrapping them with newspaper around them and

keeping them securely together in a bag is usually enough. I normally bring an assortment of little plastic display bags to keep soft minerals from rubbing on and being scratched by other rocks.

SHIPPING CAN BE AN EXCELLENT OPTION When tempting stones are heavy—too heavy to carry on an airplane going home or just too large for you to manage on your own, it's time to ship them. Some shows have on-site shippers who will handle everything from wrapping your rocks to getting them to your front porch. Warning! This is not cheap. Not even a little. However, they have the materials and shipping capability to make sure your purchases arrive intact.

DYI SHIPPING BASICS If you decide to take the DYI options, especially for fragile specimens, the people at Treasure Mountain Mining have created a very detailed description of how they ship minerals that have fragile crystals, etc. You can find it at: http://www.treasuremountainmining.com/index.php?route=pavblog/blog&id=36

Another DYI tip I picked up somewhere: if you really want to be sure your item isn't smashed or damaged, especially if it is fragile, pack it securely like the directions above. Go out and purchase a new, light weight cooler like a Coleman or Igloo brand. Put the secure package in the cooler and pad it liberally so it won't shift in transit and put the cooler back inside the box it came in. Then all you have to do is tape it closed, label and ship!

As for my damaged anthracite, I think if the Tyvek bag had been inside of a box, it would have come through fine. In case you're wondering what I plan to do with coal, anthracite is a very hard and shiny coal. I like to do "lapidary meals" where all the foodstuffs are minerals.

You might be a rockhound if... you take longer to get up the gravel driveway than to visit the person at the end of it...

2017 Solar Eclipse ~ August 21

On 2017 August 21, a total eclipse of the Sun is visible from within a narrow corridor that traverses the United States of America. The path of the Moon's umbral shadow begins in northern Pacific and crosses the USA from west to east through parts of the following states: Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia, and South Carolina (note: only a tiny corner of Montana and Iowa are in the eclipse path). The Moon's penumbral shadow produces a partial eclipse visible from a much larger region covering most of North America.
