Smart Solutions for Your Jewelry Making Problem

Last month I mentioned my club's effort to start holding in-person meetings in September. These are now allowed by the city, but we worried that many of our members might not be ready to venture out just yet. So we opted to try it in hybrid mode to accommodate both.

By hybrid, I mean that our club meeting would be attended by some members from home via their computers and by other members at an in-person session in our old meeting room.

Well, it was a success in every way. Our club's Zoom Coordinator, Darren, pulled off this nice technical success without a glitch. Attendance was like a typical meeting. A total of thirty people showed up - 10 in person and 20 online. And that included two in-person guests who may join as new members.

Participants from home took part in the business meeting and enjoyed the speaker's talk as we've done over the last 18 months with Zoom. Participants in the meeting room watched everything via the digital projector we use for speaker presentations and could speak to the online participants using a camera and microphone. Both audiences could ask questions at our business meeting and during the speaker's presentation. The evening speaker and the Club President participated from home.

We're keeping track of the numbers. Obviously, the rental cost of the meeting room is a little expensive for a small turn-out of just 10 people, but we feel it's necessary to continue experimenting to find the best way forward for the club to be able to serve all members.

LAYOUT TOOLS

Dimensions on some features of a design can be



fluid while others must be accurate for the design to work. When precision on a piece is important, good layout techniques are essential. These are the tools that I rely upon to get holes in the right place, to achieve correct angles, and to cut pieces the correct length.

I like crisp sharp lines to follow, so I often coat surfaces with a dark marker and scribe my layout lines onto the metal. A square makes quick work of checking right angles or marking where to cut, and the thin center punch helps me mark a place to drill holes exactly where I want them.

Finally, a good set of dividers is probably my favorite layout tool. They let me quickly mark a strip for cutting, swing an arc, and divide a line or curve into as many equal segments as I need. I keep at least one set of dividers in every toolbox.

INVENTORY RECORD

In an ideal world each of us who sells their jewelry has a good record with photos of all pieces in our inventory. We use it for insurance purposes, to record the cost to produce, to note where the item was sent out on consignment, and maybe to store descriptive text for marketing. Eventually, we note in the record when the piece was sold and for how much.

It's nice to also have good pictures of each piece, but sometimes we don't have time for a full-on photo session. In situations like this it's worth doing a quick group shot with the help of a phone, a camera, a scanner, or even a color copier. The quality is at least sufficient for an accurate identification in case a piece is lost.

Safety ~

Happy October! Good grief, I guess that in 3 or 4 weeks we will start seeing the Christmas decorations and based on the supply chain issue, if you have

not gotten that perfect present, maybe next year. Sorry; but this is an issue, and all have probably seen the supply chain issues in the grocery stores. We finally got the automatic dishwasher that was supposed to have been delivered in mid-August. Anyway, we do have it. I did remember how to wash dishes by hand.

Ok, lapidary stuff. This month I am repeating the admonitions of you are responsible for your own safety and must review what your plans are to complete your task. Now, talking about saws. Rock saws must be treated with respect, if you are to have a useful life out of these. Proper lubrication and in some cases, alignment must be performed. I have a 6" saw that needs new bearings. This is an old saw, about 50 years old, I have had the saw for 15 years and gotten good service out of the unit. Before I figured out that you must let the saw do the cutting on a stone, I bent a blade when I jammed the piece into the blade then twisted the piece. Well, as luck would have it, I worked the kink out of the blade and have used it for several years. Now the bearings are so bad they rapidly overheated and my chore is to disassemble the machine and replace the bearings. One thing learned on replacing bearings on a cabbing machine, the alignment is critical, if you are to have a smooth-running saw or cabbing machine. Replacing the bearings is not a big chore, but the alignment is. Patience is required along with the proper personal protection, particularly safety glasses.

As all know, the stone and saw will dictate the feed speed of the stone to the saw. A soft stone may seem to be an easier cut, unless the material mats the diamond surface. I have cut several very soft stones and found that the lubricant makes a big difference. If the lubricant washes away the residue from the stone, it goes faster. As with a cabbing machine and a soft stone proper "rinsing" away the stone residue speeds the cutting. Also, these is a great diversity of opinion on the lubricant for the saws, several folks use specialty prepared lubricants and other use mineral oil and some use motor oil. I have only used mineral oil and motor oil. To me the mineral oil is much better, it is easier to clean up after cutting as the motor oil does a good job of being everywhere and more difficult to clean up.

Meteor Shower Alert ~

October 8, 2021, nightfall and evening, Draconids



In 2021, watch the Draconid meteors at nightfall and early evening on October 8. You might catch some on the nights before and after, as well. Fortunately, the thin waxing crescent moon sets before nightfall. It won't hinder this year's Draconid shower. The radiant point for the Draconid meteor shower almost coincides with the head of the constellation Draco the Dragon in the northern sky. That's why the Draconids are best viewed from the Northern Hemisphere. The Draconid shower is a real oddity, in that the radiant point stands highest in the sky as darkness falls. That means that, unlike many meteor showers, more Draconids are likely to fly in the evening hours than in the morning hours after midnight. This shower is usually a sleeper, producing only a handful of languid meteors per hour in most years. But watch out if the Dragon awakes! In rare instances, fiery Draco has been known to spew forth many hundreds of meteors in a single hour.

October 21, 2021, before dawn, Orionids

Unfortunately a full moon accompanies 2021's Orionid shower. Try watching for these meteors in the wee hours before dawn on October 21. You won't escape the moon, though. On a dark, moonless night, the Orionids exhibit a maximum of about 10 to 20 meteors per hour. More meteors tend to fly after midnight, and the Orionids are typically at their best in the wee hours before dawn. These fast-moving meteors occasionally leave persistent trains. The Orionids sometimes produce bright fireballs, which might be able to overcome a moonlit glare. If you trace these meteors backward, they seem to radiate from the Club of the famous constellation Orion the Hunter. *Via the website listed above*

Safety continued from page 7. Anyway, be careful, I was "properly" trained on a 6" saw by a guy that was a stickler for safety and cleaning up after you finished. He was even more of a stickler around the cabbing machines. He once threatened to withdraw a person access to the workshop because she was digging the stone into the face of the

wheel and had gouged a hole in the wheel and then she complained that the machine was at fault. Of course, the dumb machine caused everything, including her stone digging into the wheel. Anyway, she did not make too many return trips and our machines tended to last longer. Folks need training on the use

of all the equipment and for a good service life, these machines need proper maintenance and care. And as you perform these maintenance activities and use the equipment be prepared and understand the issues and the hazards.

As a closing, on a TV program highlighting survivors, one guy had never owned a gun. His gun jammed and in clearing the jam he shot his thumb. Fortunately the TV series folks had an emergency vehicle close by and rushed him the emergency room. He lost about an inch of his thumb, but still had most of it. The moral of this is understand what you are doing and if you need training, get it. In the south one of the most overused comments is "betcha you can't do this", often with not the planned outcome.

Be safe and be prepared, the hurricanes and storms do not care whether you are vaccinated or not.
