#### President's Message

Hello rockhounds.

I've done a lot of thinking lately about our club's governance issues. And I have a question that maybe someone with first hand knowledge could answer. Why do you think the founders of Alabama Mineral and Lapidary Society decided to incorporate their little rock club? They were already having fun with their friends looking for rocks, swapping rocks, making stuff with their rocks, and just hanging out together at the lake with their families. Maybe back there in the fifties it was just the "thing to do", harking back to the British learned societies of the nineteenth century and before. It may be that the only thing we have to go on to answer this question is the "Purpose" stated on page one of the bylaws: "The primary purpose of this Society is for persons interested in the study, collection and lapidary treatment of rocks and minerals, to associate as members. The general purposes for which this corporation is formed are to stimulate interest in rocks and minerals by furtherance of the activities of the members of this corporation in the earth sciences; to disseminate knowledge, methods and procedures for the collection, identification, classification, cutting, polishing, setting and mounting of specimens for these activities; and to promote good fellowship, proper ethics and conduct in the relations of said members with each other and with members of other earth science societies in pursuit of these activities." But do you really need a corporation to do this? Well, actually, yes. The club needs to be a legal entity to collect money, have a bank account for making payments, and for signing contracts. All quite necessary for renting a meeting hall, a workshop, and a show venue. So, if we do want to have meetings, operate a workshop, and pay for it all with the money we make producing an annual show, then we need to fulfill the legal formality of being a corporation. And that is why we need officers and a board of directors. (It would also be a great fringe benefit if those officers and directors managed things so that we could all have a good time. (see "Purpose").

So, as president pro tem, my number one objective is to make sure that all the necessary offices are filled. But that's not all I need to do. I need some serious communication, particularly with newly joined club

members who will be enjoying the club from now on. What our members really want from their club? Do we really want to continue monthly physical meetings? I can't imagine otherwise but maybe that is the way of the future. Do we want a workshop? If not then we don't need a show to pay for it. Then I hope that, with those questions answered and other suggestions taken into account, when our incoming government is fully formed, we can adjust our ways of running the club accordingly. (By the way, this will most likely involve revising the bylaws so I need volunteers to work on that. New member Anthony Piazza has already volunteered but this will take a bare minimum of three people, probably really five or six, some old members and some new) Our ability to get things right going forward is completely dependent on the quality of the feedback we get in the next few weeks. Fair warning to new members: you will be contacted directly in the near future regarding these questions. Please remember that this club does not have any employees. We have only part-time volunteers to run our operation. So guess what? If we can't get enough volunteers to do the work then everything falls apart. And I'm just being real here, that could happen sooner than you think. So I hope more members will do what I have done and decide to put more effort into the club for the next few months to put it in healthy condition for future success.

#### **Minutes from October Meeting**

AMLS meeting October 13, 2023

Allison said our blessing and we all lined up for the pot luck. Levan announced that our show was a great success and that we would like to continue holding it at the Irondale Civic Center. We had around 800 paying admission plus many children and cleared about \$8,000 once all the bills were paid. This will enable us to keep the workshop for another year. When we approached the Civic Center about next year we were informed that it had already been reserved for the Saturday of Labor Day weekend. Both Ben and Reggie had told the manager we wanted it but for Irondale the first party to put down a deposit gets it. A search for another venue was made and vendors were consulted then the board voted to put deposits down with the Irondale Civic Center for the weekend after Labor Day for 2024 and Labor Day weekend for 2025. The club needed to vote on this so Don Hill made a motion to plan on having the show on those two dates and putting deposits down, Sandra Sullivan seconded and the motion passed.

Ben Beadore will not be the chairman for the 2024 show but will assist the committee in putting things together. The committee will have a chairman plus someone for vendor relations, show production, and promotion. Each of these people will get help from volunteers. Ben, Casey, Allison and the whole crew did a fantastic job on the show! Thanks to all the volunteers and special thanks to Bonnie Gaston for the vendor meal. John Cook has made thank-you certificates for each one.

We have added 45 new members since the show, that's 29 adults, 10 kids and 6 extended family members. Members need to meet them and find out where their interests lie. Don't forget to check out the members-only section of the website and the members only Facebook page, these require an invitation.

**NEW BUSINESS!** Levan is stepping down from his position as club president immediately He is having health issues and must slow down for a while.

With gratitude for his service to the club, we voted to accept his resignation. Reggie made the motion and Don Hill seconded. Sandra Sullivan, as vice president, is unable to move into the president's role so Reggie Bolton has offered to come out of retirement to fill in until March. Election of officers will be suspended for 6 months during which time we will form working groups and find members willing to fill the positions. He made the motion and Levan seconded. The club voted to accept. Working groups need to be put together to find a new president and first vice president who is in charge of field trips. Remember that none of the officers act alone, they look to others for help when needed and there are monthly board meetings to discuss what is going on. New members are welcome to step up and help. We need to know from them why they joined, what are their skills and interests. A committee sign-up sheet was passed around.

Each year AMLS awards 2 scholarships, the Kontzen scholarship and one for education. Applications are due by the November meeting and awarded in December. These are used to attend a 1 week class at William Holland (or Wild Acres) school of lapidary arts. A class plus room and board are covered but not class fees or materials. Volunteering for club tasks and positions are looked upon favorably when the committee makes their decision. Larry and Diana Carby donated a scholarship for this year, many thanks to them!

The AMLS by-laws need to be updated every 10 years and we are in the tenth year so we need a committee for that. Who will bring the donuts now that Bob Smith has passed? We also need Operating Procedures written up because they are more day to day and more easily amended than the by-laws.



### Classes Scheduled for November & December


Education chair Yvonne





#### Agate, Jasper, Chalcedony?

If you read about the gem materials used in rock tumbling, you will encounter three names over and over again. The names are "agate," "jasper" and "chalcedony". These names appear so often because they are the perfect materials for polishing in both rotary and vibratory rock tumblers. Telling the difference between agate and jasper is easy with most specimens. However, some stones can show properties of both agate and jasper. For those specimens, you can simply call them "chalcedony" and be right every time.

Chalcedony: Chalcedony is a generic name given to materials that are composed of microcrystalline quartz. Agate and jasper are both varieties of chalcedony. "Microcrystalline" means that the quartz is in the form of crystals that are so small that a microscope must be used to visualize them individually

Agate: Agate is a translucent to semitransparent chalcedony. If you have a piece that is semitransparent, you will be able to hold a very thin piece up to the light and see distorted or foggy images through it. If you hold a translucent piece up to a source of light, you will see a small amount of light passing through the thin edges.



A collection of brightly-colored agates. Included in this are banded agates, plume agates, mossy agates, and eye agates in a wide variety of colors.

Jasper: Jasper is an opaque variety of chalcedony. Opaque means that neither light nor images pass through. Jasper contains enough impurities and foreign material to render it opaque.

The primary difference between agate and jasper is in their diaphaneity. The word "diaphaneity" is used to describe "how easily

light passes through a material". There are three general levels of diaphaneity. They are, from highest to lowest:

- Transparent (light and images pass through)
- **Translucent** (light passes through)
- Opaque (no light passes through)

**TRIP:** This is a well-known site for collecting. The 400-million-year-old granitoid gneiss was formed by the metamorphism of the Antreville Pluton. The pluton was later fractured and hydrothermal fluids moved through the fractures depositing silica.

**COLLECTING:** The site is known for quartz crystals. Amethyst, smoky quartz, skeletal quartz, angle plated quartz, beryl, garnet, and epidote have been found.

**BRING:** Bring shovels of different sizes, small rakes, chisels, brushes, and a spray bottle. Also bring water and food.

**REQUIREMENTS:** Bring safety glasses in case you plan to break rocks.

TERRAIN/SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Easy site to access. Can be muddy at the site due to rains.



CHILDREN (Yes): Children need to be supervised.

PETS (Yes): Well-behaved pets on leash are allowed.

**FACILITIES:** Porta potty, there is a store a few miles away.

**REGISTRATION:** Click here to fill out a registration form. If you register and are unable to attend the trip, please be considerate to your fellow rockhounds and let us know as soon as possible so someone on a potential waiting list can take your slot(s).

**DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET:** Registered participants will be sent a confirmation email with directions and meeting place details.

**CARPOOLING:** The registration form has a place for you to indicate if you <u>need</u> a ride; if you can <u>offer</u> a ride; or if you would like to <u>drive or share</u> a carpool ride. If you choose any of these options, your <u>name</u>, <u>email address</u>, and <u>club name</u> will be shared with other members who also choose one of the options. Then, you can communicate with one another to arrange carpools.
