Minutes for February AMLS Board Meeting

AMLS board meeting January 23, 2024 in attendance Levan & Yvonne Foster, Ben Beadore, Reggie & Bunny Bolton, Sandra Sullivan, Jinger Glasgow

It's budget time! Reggie worked with Larry Hensley for several hours on a spread sheet of club accounting and forwarded it to Levan. Unless someone has any major changes we'll use last year's budget making changes as necessary. Yvonne, as education chair, wants to add \$500. for teachers and tools. John Gaston, as historian, had 3 years of club history bound. Membership stands at around 75 adults and 50 kids so SFMS dues will be paid on those numbers.

The board went over the budget line by line and made changes as needed. That will be sent separately.

Jinger has arranged for Steven Meredith to give a program on arrowheads at the February meeting.

Ben pointed out that club participation is in crisis. Maybe reach out to Huntsville, Montgomery, and other state clubs to see how they approach this problem. Online may be the best way to recruit younger members. One way to do this may be another FB page for meetings and to promote with paid advertising like we did to for the show which was very successful. And yes, this has to be a separate FB page because of the advertising.

There is a lot of work to be done here and volunteers are needed to do it!

Reggie asked "How are we going to govern our club?" We need a president, 1st & 2nd vice president, treasurer plus a webmaster. Rhonda suggested zoom meetings as get-togethers and joint meetings with other clubs with similar interests such as paleontology and art. Jillian suggested that meeting at a time other than Friday night would be better for young people. Club by-laws need to be updated and streamlined and operating procedures expanded. There should be a list of duties for each officer.

Levan said the 5th Sunday cabbng party falls on Easter so it will be moved to Sunday April 7. More details to follow.

Door prizes were given out and the meeting adjourned.

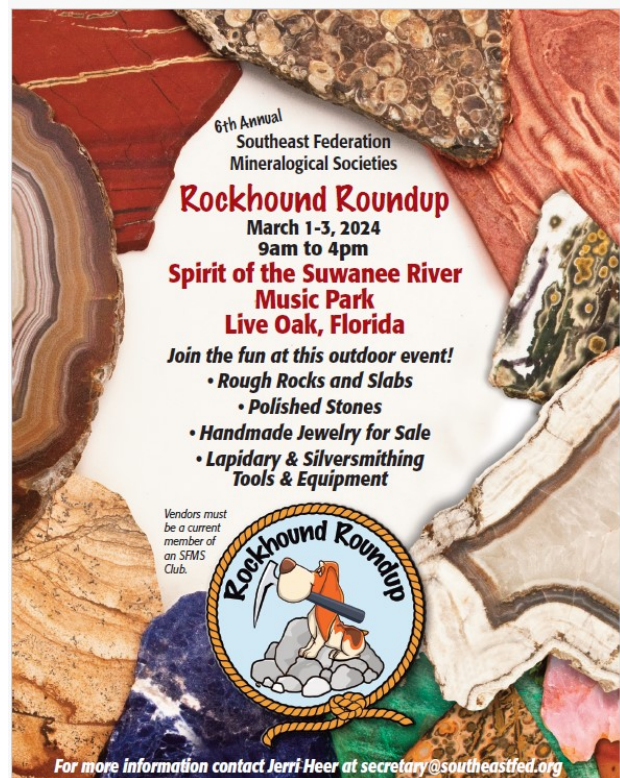

Collecting Savannah River Agate, Girard, GA

No Limit Registration Required (Link is below) Fee: None

BRING: Colorful, agatized material can be found on the surface at the site, but many people usually bring light digging tools and small pry bars to free larger boulders from the sandy soil. Leather gloves are recommended. Bring plenty of water and dress for the weather.

TERRAIN: Large flat area with parking close by. Material is readily available.

RESTRICTIONS: Collecting is allowed only in the right of way areas of the road. NO collecting in the woods or adjoining private property. NO digging allowed in the road. DO NOT BLOCK THE ROAD.

CHILDREN: This field trip is suitable for most children but collecting is on a road so children are required to have adult supervision at all times.

PETS: Dogs are allowed but must be kept on a leash at all times.

FACILITIES: There are no facilities at this site. The nearest facilities are several miles away.

REGISTRATION: Contact the trip chairman at the information below. Please provide the names of all of the people you are registering (including yourself) as well as a phone number and email address you want us to use for contact tracing if any attendees report testing positive for COVID-19 after the trip. If you register for this trip then test positive for COVID-19, if you are exposed to COVID-19 within 2 weeks before the trip, or if you are unable to attend the trip, please be considerate to your fellow rockhounds and let us know as soon as possible so someone on the waiting list can take your slot(s).

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: Registered participants will be sent a confirmation email with directions and meeting place details.

CARPPOOLING: The registration form has a place for you to indicate if you need a ride; if you can offer a ride; or if you would like to drive or share a carpool ride. If you choose any of these options, your name, email address, and club name will be shared with other members who also choose one of the options. Then, you can communicate with one another to arrange carpools.

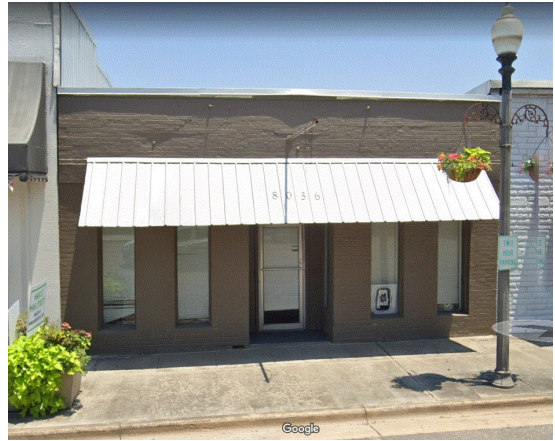

FEBRUARY BIRTHSTONE: AMETHYST



Amethyst, the modern and traditional February birthstone, has a rich history and strong symbolic ties to love and spirituality. Due to its beauty, availability, and durability, this purple gem has become a very popular jewelry stone.

During the Middle Ages, royalty proudly wore amethysts because the color purple was associated with nobility. High-ranking priests also wore amethysts to represent piety. Amethysts were considered to be one of the "cardinal gems," along with diamond, sapphire, ruby, and emerald. They were often used in crowns, scepters, and other royal regalia. At this time, only people of the highest social status wore amethysts.

Over the centuries, more sources of the colorful gem were discovered, making it more available and affordable. Today, the February birthstone is one of the top choices for jewelry stones.

Amethyst is crystalline quartz in colors ranging from pale lilac to deep reddish purple. It has a relatively high hardness of 7, which means it's very scratch resistant.

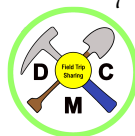
