John Gaston moved that the show be held Labor Day week-end and Vivian Melof seconded. That motion passed so John Wild moved we send the deposit check. Jinger Glasgow seconded and the motion was passed.

Levan Foster has volunteered to be our next president. Reggie moved that we accept the slate of officers as printed in the December Rockhound Roundup. Lynn Ray seconded and the motion passed. A photo of the new officers and the passing of the gavel was taken. Sandra announced that the scholarships awarded in 2020 will be used in 2022. January 2-3, 2022, night, Quadrantids

In 2022, watch for the Quadrantids after midnight and before dawn on January 3. The moon will be new, making for great meteor-observing conditions. The Quadrantids can produce over 100 meteors per hour in a moonless sky, and this year is such a time. This is great, because the narrow peak of this shower lasts only about six hours, although the range of Quarantid meteor activity is from December 26, 2021, to January 16, 2022. The radiant point is in the part of the sky that used to be considered the constellation Quadrans Muralis, the Mural Quadrant. The radiant is near the famous Big Dipper asterism (see chart here). In January, it's in the north-northeastern sky after midnight and highest up before dawn. Because the radiant is fairly far to the north on the sky's dome, meteor numbers tend to be greater at northerly latitudes in the Northern Hemisphere.

Mark your calendars ~ April 21-22, 2022, night, Lyrids

In 2022, we expect peak viewing in the dark hours before the last quarter moon rises. The best time to watch is between sunset on April 21 and moonrise in the early morning. The Lyrid meteor shower – April's shooting stars – lasts from about April 15 to 29. About 10 to 15 meteors per hour can be expected around the shower's peak, in a dark sky. The Lyrids are known for uncommon surges that can sometimes bring the rate up to 100 per hour. Those rare outbursts aren't easy to predict, but they're one of the reasons the tantalizing Lyrids are worth checking out. The radiant for this shower is near the bright star Vega in the constellation Lyra (chart here). The radiant rises in the northeast at about 10 p.m. on April evenings.



How to Use Geologist's Tools

Geologists use tools help them identify rock and minerals, map outcrops, and get a close look at their samples. Some tools are strictly for the laboratory but some are great in the lab and out in the field. We like those the best! In these short articles, you can learn how to use a hand lens, streak plates, household items, and the Mohs Hardness Scale to identify rock and mineral samples that you have in your Mini Me Geology kits or ones that you find out in nature.

How to Use Streak Plates

Streak plates are a great tool to start to determine the identity of your minerals. First, choose a mineral and a streak plate. Try both streak plates, but in general you will probably want to use the white streak plate with dark colored minerals and the black streak plate with light colored minerals.

Place the streak plate on a table and scratch the mineral across the plate. You may have to scratch really hard to see the color. The streak color is the color of the mineral in powder form. The harder the mineral, the harder you will likely have to scratch. If you need help, ask an adult to try to scratch the mineral on the streak plate.

Identifying a Mineral Using Mohs Hardness Scale The hardness of a mineral is often used by geologists to help determine the identity of a sample. The Mohs Hardness Scale as developed by a German geologist, Friedrich Mohs, in 1812. The Mohs scale is a relative scale which lists the hardness of 10 common minerals. Talc, #1 on the scale is the softest and diamond, #10, is the hardest. Other common household item have also been assigned to the hardness scale such as glass, fingernail and penny. The Mohs mineral scale and common object are:
