Sandra and Reggie plan to discuss the recent annual board meeting of the Southeastern Federation of Mineralogical Societies. Levan asked Reggie if he had a good count of paid members since we need to pay SFMS dues and insurance based on that number. They will work on that in the near future.

John Wild reported that the IRS needed a copy of the original club Articles of Incorporation. He downloaded them from the Alabama Secretary of State and faxed them to our agent. Once again, we wait for their response.


TWISTING WIRE

Twisting wire can be done with an old hand drill but goes much faster with a power tool. My preference is to use a screw gun, although a Foredom should do

Just make a little hook out of coat hanger wire (or use a screw-in cup hook) and chuck it up in your screw gun. Grip the free ends of the wire in a vice and slip the looped end onto your hook.

Keep a little tension on the wires as you twist.

Note that a power drill is too fast a tool for this unless you have one with variable speed.



SOLDERING PRONGS

I often use prongs to hold an irregular cab or other object on rings and pendants. But prongs can be a little tricky to solder. You have to find some way to hold them all upright while soldering, and the simple butt joint that looks strong sometimes breaks when you start to bend the prong over the stone. There's nothing worse than having a prong break off when you're setting the stone $*\#\sim^*!$

I solved both problems with one little trick. It keeps the prongs in position for soldering, and it gives you a stronger joint at the same time.

Bench Tips Continued ...

Locate and center punch the position for each prong. Then drill holes a little smaller than your prong wire. Sand a small taper on the ends of your prong wires and stand them up in the holes. The wires support themselves, soldering is easy, and the joint is stronger because of the increased soldering

Meteor shower guide in 2022 ... April's Lyrid meteors are next! The annual Lyrid meteor shower always brings an end to the meteor drought that occurs each year between January and mid-April.

Predicted peak: April 22, 2022, at 18 UTC.

When to watch: Watch late evening until moonrise,

nights of April 21-22 and 22-23.

Duration of shower: April 15 to April 29.

Radiant: Rises before midnight, highest in the sky at

dawn. See chart below.

Nearest moon phase: In 2022, last quarter is 11:56 UTC on April 23. So the predawn hours of 2022's Lyrid shower are washed in moonlight. But – on the nights of April 21 and 22 – there's a window of time from late evening until moonrise, during which you might see some Lyrid meteors in 2022. Expected meteors at peak, under ideal

conditions: In a dark sky with no moon, you might see 10 to 15 Lyrids per hour.

TRIP: The March 2022 SFMS DMC Field Trip is sponsored by the Mobile Rock & Gem Society to collect Summerville Agate at the quarry in Summerville Georgia. This site has been a long-time favorite of many collectors. The agate forms within Mississippian age chert as delicate concentric bands. Colors are predominantly gray and red.

COLLECTING: Material is generally found by simply surface collecting, although there are plenty of large pieces and boulders for those so inclined to break them apart.

BRING: Eye protection is a must for anyone wishing to break apart material with a rock hammer, or sledge, or are nearby someone else doing so! Things, such as a hammer, chisels, scratching tools, pry bars, buckets, small ground shovels and rakes, paper to wrap specimens, sunscreen, bug spray, food and drinks, sturdy shoes, and gloves. Much of the material is covered with a chalky white chert, and a pail of water is sometimes handy for dipping and identifying the better material. A small cart or hand truck may be useful for hauling larger pieces of take home material.

REQUIREMENTS: ALL participants will be required to sign a waiver of liability before being allowed into the collection area.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS: THIS IS AN ACTIVE QUARRY. NO ONE WILL BE ALLOWED ANYWHERE NEAR ANY OF THE MACHINERY ON THE PREMISES. ANY VIOLATION OF THIS RULE MAY JEOPARDIZE FUTURE FIELD TRIPS TO THIS SITE

FEE: There is no fee.

CHILDREN: Children are allowed but are required to have adult supervision at all times.

PETS: No pets allowed.

FACILITIES: There are no facilities on-site. The nearest restrooms are approximately 3 miles away in Summerville.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: From Summerville, Ga. follow US 27 South for 2.20 miles. The site will be on the right between the county owned waste dumpsters and the US Forestry office.

Coming north from the Rome area, the site will be on the left side of US 27, and approximately 3.0 miles beyond the intersection of Gore Subligna Rd.

From downtown Summerville (Commerce St.) take U.S. 27S. There will be a left curve, then a right curve. Just past the right curve is the mine (7525 Hwy 27). Look for the Mobile Rock and Gem Society signs.
