## COLORING EPOXY

There are two ways to add color when you are using epoxies. The first is to add a powdered material like colored chalk, charcoal, or powdered colors from an art supply store. One that I particularly like is a set of pastel glitter powders. A second way is to add a liquid pigment like nail polish, model airplane paint, or tinting pigments from a marine supplies store.

In preparing epoxy for use, the important things are to use exactly equal parts of the two components and to thoroughly mix them together. Coloring material can be added at any time. If I'm making just a small amount, I squeeze out equal sized droplets onto a piece of scrap paper or aluminum foil and mix thoroughly with a toothpick.



To mix larger amounts of epoxy, I use a gram scale to weigh the first component. Then I zero the scale and weigh out the same amount of the second component, add coloring if needed, and mix.

If you are using 5-minute epoxy, the mixing needs to move quickly. But I like to work carefully when adding color. So I squeeze out equal sized droplets side by side on the scrap paper. Then I work with just one of the droplets to add the colors. The 5-minute clock only starts when you mix in the second droplet.

#### *Bench Tips Continued* ... TRY A TOOTHPICK

TRY A TOOTHPICK

The round, stronger toothpicks have a multitude of uses on the jewelry bench. I use them for mixing epoxy resin, for applying paste solder, and with Zam for polishing in tight spots.

Toothpicks are also handy for holding a small faceted stone while setting it. Just break off the sharp tip, mold a little beeswax over it, and press it onto the table of your stone.

Meteor shower guide in 2022 ... April's Lyrid meteors are next! The annual Lyrid meteor shower always brings an end to the meteor drought that occurs each year between January and mid-April.

Predicted peak: April 22, 2022, at 18 UTC.
When to watch: Watch late evening until moonrise, nights of April 21-22 and 22-23.
Duration of shower: April 15 to April 29.
Radiant: Rises before midnight, highest in the sky at dawn. See chart below.
Nearest moon phase: In 2022, last quarter is 11:56 UTC on April 23. So the predawn hours of 2022's Lyrid shower are washed in moonlight. But – on the nights of April 21 and 22 – there's a window of time from late evening until moonrise, during which you might see some Lyrid meteors in 2022. Expected

meteors at peak, under ideal conditions: In a dark sky with no moon, you might see 10 to 15 Lyrids per hour.

The club scheduled to host the April DMC field trip is not able to do so. Charles Carter, SFMS Field Trip Chair, has arranged a replacement trip with help from the Georgia Mineral Society.

NOTE: DMC field trips will continue to be planned and scheduled, but may be cancelled or rescheduled pending COVID-19 status. If there are any changes to a trip, all contacts listed for DMC member clubs will be notified via email as soon as possible. The DMC trip schedule page on the SFMS website (https://www.southeastfed.org/sfms-field-trips/dmc-field-trip-program/dmc-field-trip-schedule) will also be updated with the current status of trips. Lori Carter, DMC Coordinator.

**TRIP:** This location is part of the Corbin Gneiss Complex. The quarry is mining porphyroblastic granite gneiss, so the rock there has large crystals, e.g., quartz and feldspar. The rocks here are some of the oldest in Georgia - approximately 1.2 billion years.

**COLLECTING:** We will be collecting granitic gneiss with blue quartz. Small pieces can be collected by hand and larger pieces can be collected with hammer and chisel. This material can be cut and polished and it also makes nice specimens.

**BRING:** Tools needed include rock hammer, small sledge, chisel, scratching tools, buckets, and a spray bottle with water to wet the rocks so you can see the color better. You will also need sunscreen and gloves.

**REQUIREMENTS:** Gloves, safety glasses, hard hat, and steel toed or sturdy boots with ankle support (e.g., hiking boots). No open toed shoes allowed.

**SPECIAL CONDITIONS:** This is an active quarry. STAY AWAY from all heavy equipment, high walls, ponds, and quarry machinery.

**TERRAIN AND ACCESSIBILITY:** There are flat areas and areas with loose rock. People with mobility issues may have some difficulty navigating over and around boulders. There may also be soft, muddy areas if it rains before or during these trips. Collecting areas are within 100 yards from where we park.

**REGISTRATION:** Participants must register with the online form here.

**CHILDREN (Yes):** The quarry allows children, but they must have adult supervision at all times. And, they must have all of the required safety equipment.

PETS (Yes): No pets allowed.

FACILITIES: There are NO facilities at this location. Food and restrooms are several miles away.

**ACCOMMODATIONS:** There are many hotels in Cartersville, GA, which is less than half an hour away from the location.

**ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:** Georgia Mineral Society members will be available to answer questions. There will also be a sign-in table with examples of collecting material.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET: Registered attendees will receive directions via email. Quarry employees will escort a caravan into the quarry. You are not allowed to drive around the quarry un-escorted. Everyone must enter and leave the quarry together.

If you arrive <u>late</u> you will not be able to enter the quarry!
