DEBURRING A HOLE

When you drill a hole, there's always a burr produced on the underside of the metal. We all have our ways of removing them - typically by filing or sanding the area smooth. But

doing it this way will put scratches on your piece that will have to be polished off.

A quick way to remove the burr is to grab a drill that's two or three times larger than your hole. Simply twist it in the hole to cut off the burr. I usually do this twisting by hand, but if you have many holes to do, it's easier on your fingers to put the drill into a holder like a pin vice.

CLEANING STEEL SHOT

Steel shot in a vibratory or rotary tumbler works great to burnish and shine your finished silver pieces. But a common problem is how keep the shot clean. Carbon steel shot can get rusty if exposed to the air, and even stainless-steel shot can sometimes develop a blackish coating that's hard to remove.

My solution of choice to clean the shot is Classic Coke. Just pour an ounce or two over the shot and let the tumbler run for an hour or so. A bad case might require a second cleaning. Some folks like to let the bubbles in the Coke dissipate before using it so that gas pressure doesn't build up in the tumbler barrel. I've heard that it's the phosphoric acid in Coke that does the trick.

While you're waiting for the shot to clean up, just settle back and enjoy the rest of the Coke.

The Arietids – the year's most active daytime meteor shower – peak around June 7. You might catch a meteor or two in a dark sky, in the sunrise direction, in the dark hour before dawn breaks. And read more about the Arietids from EarthSky's Don Machholz. He discovered the parent comet for this shower! Next up, summer meteors. Start watching in late July and early August for the Delta Aquariid shower to combine with the Perseid shower.

Late July to mid-August meteors ... the Delta Aquariids

Predicted peak: July 29, 2022, at 10 UTC. But this shower doesn't have a noticeable peak. It rambles along steadily from late July through early August, joining forces with the August Perseids.

When to watch: Watch late July through early August, mid-evening to dawn.

Duration of shower: July 18 to August 21. **Radiant:** Rises in mid-evening, highest around 2 a.m. your local time and low in the sky by dawn. See

chart below.

Nearest moon phase: In 2022, new moon falls at 17:55 UTC on July 28. And full moon will fall at 1:36 UTC on August 12. Take advantage of the moon-free mornings in late July and early August for watching the Delta Aquariids (and the Perseids). Expected meteors at peak, under ideal conditions: The Delta Aquariids' maximum hourly rate can reach 15 to 20 meteors in a dark sky with no moon. You'll typically see plenty of Delta Aquariids mixed in with the Perseids, if you're watching in early August, especially when there's no moon to obscure the view. Note: Like May's Eta Aquariids, July's Delta Aquariids favors the Southern Hemisphere. Skywatchers at high northern latitudes tend to discount it. But the shower can be excellent from latitudes like those in the southern U.S. Delta Aquariid meteors tend to be fainter than Perseid meteors. So a moon-free dark sky is essential. About 5% to 10% of the Delta Aquariid meteors leave persistent trains, glowing ionized gas trails that last a

second or two after the meteor has passed. **Keep looking UP**

TRIP: The first "rock" was discovered inadvertently on the farm. While repairing a tractor, Moton Propst and his son-in-law Ronald Lineberger needed a hammer or something to knock a bolt through a hole. The handiest thing available was a large rock laying on the ground. Ronald picked it up and when the dirt fell off, he realized this wasn't your average rock. It had an odd shape and was heavier than most rocks so he put it in his truck as a souvenir. After carrying that rock around for several years, Ronald stopped at a friend's house who he knew to be a Rock Hound (Tobe Cash from Lincolnton). Tobe was sifting dirt that he had just brought home from Hiddenite, NC. Upon seeing the "ROCK" Tobe said, "Where did you get that?" Ronald told him it came out of his backyard and Tobe said, "Let's go home!" Tobe immediately went to Ron's house and crawled around on his hands and knees for several hours discovering more of the same type rocks. Being a well-known rockhound, Tobe began bringing friends from all over the world to the farm which led to what is known today as the "Propst Corundum Mine".

COLLECTING: This is a great location to get some nice corundum specimens. Things found here are Corundum (var. Ruby, Sapphire), Quartz and Kyanite (rare).

BRING: Hand Tools Only -- Buckets, Shovel, Pick, Classifier i.e., screen (1/4" and 1/2" mesh), Hoe, Gloves, and Knee pads, Water and snacks/lunch.

REQUIREMENTS: All holes must be filled in before leaving. No drugs or alcohol. If you bring it in, pack it out.

TERRAIN/SPECIAL CONDITIONS: We will be parking in the yard. You can pull right up to the dig site. The digging is in red mud, so be prepared to get dirty. If we have had rain the digging will be easier.

FEE: Fee is \$35 per person for ages 14 and older. Children: \$15 for ages 11-13, and Free for ages 10 and under.

WAIVER: A signed waiver is required; these will be available onsite.
