October into early November ... the South and North Taurids

Predicted peak: The South Taurids' predicted* peak is November 5, 2022, at 18 UTC. The North Taurids' predicted* peak is November 12, 2022, at 18 UTC. But the South and North Taurids don't have very definite peaks. They ramble along in October and November and are especially noticeable from late October into early November, when they overlap.

When to watch: Best around midnight, and probably best from late October into early November. Overall duration of shower: The South Taurids run from about September 23 to November 12. North Taurids are active from about October 13 to December 2.

Radiant: Rises in early evening, highest in the sky around midnight. See chart below.

Nearest moon phase: In 2022, new moon falls on October 25. Full moon is November 8. So late October – when the two showers overlap and there's no moon – might be excellent for the Taurids in 2022. But you'll catch Taurid meteors throughout October and November. This custom sunrise-set calendar can show you moon rising times for your location. Be sure to check the moon rising time box. Expected meteors at peak, under ideal conditions: Under dark skies with no moon, both the South and North Taurid meteor showers produce about 5 meteors per hour (10 total when they overlap). In 2022, watch for fireballs.

Note: Taurid meteors tend to be slow-moving but sometimes very bright. The showers sometimes produce fireballs, which might make their cyclical reappearance in 2022. The American Meteor Society pointed to "a seven-year periodicity" with Taurid fireballs. 2008 and 2015 both produced them. 2022 might as well. The last Taurid fireball display, in 2015, was really fun!

PRE-MADE BEZEL CUPS

As a general rule of thumb, I assume it's going to take me 15 - 20 minutes to make a bezel for an ordinary cabochon, so for some projects buying pre-made

cups can save a lot of time. But if you go this route, keep in mind three things. First, try to get cups made from fine silver, not sterling. Fine silver is softer and burnishes over the stone more easily.

Second, you may have trouble matching the shape and size of the stone with the shape and size of the bezel cup. Purchased cups can only be found in a limited number of standard sizes. You may have to adjust your choice of gemstone to match the cup. The other consideration is that pre-made cups often have fairly low side walls. While these are fine for low-dome stones, they're not dependable for stones with steep side walls.

Lastly before setting, check the fit of your gemstone in the cup, particularly around the bottom. The bottom corners of a stamped cup are much more rounded than a bezel you would fabricate yourself. This causes a problem with stones that have a sharp edge around the bottom. Burnishing the bezel over one of these stones will place a lot of stress on the stone and may cause it to crack. To avoid this, I round off the bottom edge of the stone with a diamond file (or use sandpaper on soft stones).

DIVIDERS

A set of dividers is a tool I find very useful in laying out the geometry of a piece I'm making. It has two needle-like tips with an adjustment to set the spacing between them.

They can be used to transfer a measurement.



Let's say you need a 7mm wide strip of sheet metal. Set the spacing between the divider tips to 7 mm on the ruler. Then lay the sheet on the bench, put one tip against the edge, and run the dividers down the edge scribing a line parallel to the edge. for Jewelry Making" and

Bench Tips Continued ...

Dividers can be used to mark line or arc. For instance, assume a line between A and B that might be straight or curved, and you want to divide it into 5 equal lengths. Set the dividers to an estimate of the distance. Starting at Point A, use the dividers to mark off five lengths along the line. If you end up short of Point B, lengthen the distance on the dividers. If you end up overshooting Point B, shorten the length of your dividers. After a few tries, the length on the dividers will be the exact distance you need to mark the 5 segments.

Dividers can let you quickly find the center of a circular disk. With one tip of the dividers at the edge of the disk, set the other tip to an estimate of where the center might be. Fix one tip of the dividers at the 3 o'clock position and scribe an arc with the other tip near the center. Do this again from the 6 o'clock, 9 o'clock, and 12 o'clock positions. The arcs at the center will form a small four-sided box. The center of the box is at the center of the disk.

An Official Field Trip of the Mid-Tennessee Gem & Mineral Society (Murfreesboro, TN) (HOST)

Saturday, November 5, 2022 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM Central Time Cumberland Furnace, TN Registration Required

NOTE: DMC field trips will continue to be planned and scheduled, but may be cancelled or rescheduled pending COVID-19 status. TRIP: We are heading to Cumberland Furnace to collect slag. The slag was a byproduct of making iron. Some of the slag is quite colorful in shades of blue and green ... some with swirls. The slag is easily cut and polished and makes nice pendants – it is too soft for rings.

COLLECTING: Our target is a dump pile on the banks of the stream that runs through Cumberland Furnace (access by crossing a large field owned by the community). This dump pile is located about a ¼ of a mile from the parking area. Although the dump pile has the greatest potential, slag can be found anywhere along the banks (both upstream and downstream). Another way to search is by wading downstream from the furnace if the creek is low. I am not sure if conditions will permit - bring wading shoes just in case if you wish to collect in the stream.

BRING: You need to bring a hand tool, trowel, small shovel, etc. to dig in the slag pile and gloves to protect your hands. Bring a backpack or small buckets for carrying. Boots or wading shoes are recommended as your feet may get wet otherwise.

TERRAIN/SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Quarter mile hike through the woods to the site, the path will be slightly overgrown. There is creek and some small streams, so your feet might get wet. Stream should be low this time of the year.

FEE: There is no fee.

REGISTRATION: Click here to fill out a registration form. If you are unable to attend the trip, please be considerate to your fellow rockhounds and let us know as soon as possible so someone on a potential waiting list can take your slot(s).

CHILDREN (Yes!): Must be 6 years or older.

PETS (Yes): Leash required.

FACILITIES: No facilities at this site. Nearest gas station is one mile away.

Total lunar eclipse on November 8, 2022

A total lunar eclipse will sweep across Asia, Australia, the Americas and the Pacific on Nov. 8, 2022. **Penumbral eclipse begins** at 08:02 UTC on Nov.8 (3:02 a.m. EST).

Partial eclipse begins at 09:09 UTC on Nov.8 (4:09 a.m. EST).

Totality begins (moon engulfed in Earth's shadow) begins at 10:16 UTC on Nov.8 (5:16 a.m. EST).


Totality ends at 11:41 UTC on Nov.8 (6:41 a.m. EST). **Partial eclipse ends** at 12:49 UTC on Nov.8 (7:49 a.m. EST).

Penumbral eclipse ends at 13:56 UTC on Nov. 8 (8:56 a.m. EST).

Maximum eclipse is at 10:59 UTC on Nov.8 (5:59 a.m. EST).

Duration of totality is about 85 minutes.

Note: A total lunar eclipse when the sun, Earth and moon are aligned, with Earth in the middle. Earth's shadow falls on the moon. Nov.8, 2022, is Election Day in the U.S. And many are asking ... when was the last total lunar eclipse on Election Day?
